UNDERWATER COMMUNICATION CABLES

Charts showing the exact routes of telephone and telegraph cables in the Northwest Atlantic area are now available for the first time to fishermen. Until recently, information about the locations of the cables has been restricted by governments for military reasons. It was noted that a great increase in otter trawling has led to a serious increase in cable breaks. The cable companies hope the release of the detailed charts will help prevent trawling damage to the cables.
